Mission & Vision statements

Mission: To offer hope and support, enabling children and their mothers to break the cycle of homelessness by empowering them to become part of mainstream society as active, productive citizens through programs and special events designed to address their academic, emotional, and physical needs.



Vision: To continually seek to enhance its ability to offer significant resources to homeless children and mothers and make a demonstrable difference in their lives by creating strong partnerships and attaining financial stability.



History of CRN



Children's Restoration Network (CRN) was founded in 1993 by Jim Cox (President) and Cliff Kinsey (CEO). They recognized a growing problem facing metro Atlanta: *lack of needed services for the ever increasing number of children, and women with children, who were becoming homeless.*

For years public awareness was focused on the poorly-dressed man on the corner who would work for food. With increased relocations away from hometowns, and the breaking down of traditional families, children, and women with children, have become the fastest growing segment of the homeless population, and few agencies addressed their needs. With this in mind

CRN began working in 1993 with one Atlanta shelter that housed women and children. Each year we have added to the number of children and mothers we serve.

Today CRN works with 134 shelters and group homes in 20 counties around metro Atlanta, housing over 2,300 children each night and over 3,500 children each year. Beginning with simple tasks such as preparing home-cooked meals on Sundays, painting and brightening dreary community shelters, and providing warm winter clothing to mothers and children in need, CRN has developed a wide array of programs and special events designed to alleviate the trauma and despair of being homeless.

From the beginning CRN has recognized the value of its cherished volunteers. Growing from a few dedicated people in 1993 to over 6,000 people who volunteered with CRN in 2010, CRN recognizes that without this "life-blood" we could not hope to successfully fulfill our mission.



In this report you will find descriptions of special events *which bring almost 1,000 homeless children together* to celebrate and enjoy each other's company. We will highlight the programs and special events that CRN has developed that make life just a little easier for the children and mothers we work with.



These programs help them to, **“Keep hope alive!”** Since the beginning CRN has worked hard to ensure that a great percentage of donations go directly to the children and mothers we serve. *In 2010, once again over 90% of donations to CRN went directly into programs.*

In its 18 year history CRN has now touched the lives of over 41,000 homeless children and 12,000 adult women. CRN endeavors to provide ever increasing, and more effective programs that positively affect the lives of some of metro Atlanta's neediest children and mothers.

Homelessness in metro Atlanta

Please, don't just look away...



With the poor economy of the last two years, CRN has seen a sharp spike in the number of children, and women with children, who have been forced to seek accommodations in shelters and group homes. According to the Metro Atlanta Task force for the Homeless, more children in metro Atlanta live in poverty than any other American city. The Task Force estimates that as many as 20,000 people are homeless in Atlanta on any given day. Over 8,000 are children under the age of 18.



Children who are homeless are more likely to:

- ◆ Fall behind in school
- ◆ Suffer physical illness and malnutrition
- ◆ Suffer from physical or sexual abuse
- ◆ Develop low self esteem and attendant psychological problems
- ◆ Enter the Juvenile Justice system
- ◆ Lack regular medical attention
- ◆ Suffer developmental delays & have learning disabilities

Home, sweet home?



A car, an abandoned building, woods, and back alleys are the unheated, un-air-conditioned, unsafe home for many thousands of women and children each year. Although still homeless, the people we serve have taken the first step back to a normal existence. They have found temporary respite in a shelter or group home. In 2010, shelters and group homes served by CRN housed over 2,300 children each night and over 3,500 for the year.

2010 Spring Fling/Easter Gala



Every child, especially those going through the trauma of homelessness, needs a day when they are the center of attention. CRN's Spring Fling, held on Easter Afternoon, is just such a day. In 2010, we marked the 16th anniversary of the first major event that CRN had ever held. Volunteers began arriving at Peachtree Road United Methodist Church about noon to set up for the Gala. The jumping moons were inflated, the sno-cone and popcorn machines assembled and the grills were fired up. By the time the kids began arriving, all was prepared. Most headed straight to the food lines. The buffet line featured grilled chicken, hamburgers and hot dogs along with, baked beans, chips, fruit, potato salad, watermelon and desserts.

During the afternoon kids got their face painted, made jewelry, played basketball, and danced to some lively music. Around 4 pm over 2,000 Easter Eggs were "hidden" and the Egg Hunt began. The littlest kids were given a 2 two minute head start and then all the rest entered, and as if by magic, 3 minutes later all the eggs had been picked up. The afternoon gave a chance for people to renew acquaintances and just relax among families and friends. Kids and mothers picked up books in the Book Barn to take with them back to their shelter or group home. Most made one more trip through the food line, danced to one more song, then said their goodbyes as they prepared to leave. But one last treat remained, a beautiful, bounteous, Easter Basket was given to each child as they left. (over 1,000 in all!).

L.E.A.P.: Career Preparation Workshop 2010

While CRN's focus is on children, we understand that the best thing for a homeless child who is with their mother, is for the mother to have a job. With this in mind, we created our L.E.A.P. program which stands for Leadership, Employment, Achievement, and Prosperity.

The Atlanta Union Mission's, "My Sister's House" hosted the workshops in 2010. During the year over 125 women attended the program. The purpose of the workshops is to prepare women to go back to work or to improve their employment opportunities.



Activities at the workshop include:

- ♦ Creating or updating resumes so they are as professional-looking as possible
- ♦ Increasing the women's interview skills
- ♦ Setting up free e mail accounts so the women can communicate with prospective employees
- ♦ Gather in one place all the information needed to properly fill out a job application
- ♦ To how best explain gaps in work history and what to do if one has an arrest record

We have changed the format this year from previous years. Instead of large groups of women attending, we now have small (8-12 women) sessions where each woman gets more personal attention.

At the end of the day the women leave with a flash drive with their resume on it, several hard copies of the resume, with increased knowledge of how to obtain and retain a job, and with a more optimistic view of their own and their children's future.



HeadSmart: Back 2 School 2010

CRN believes that education is the key to breaking the cycle of homelessness

CRN held its 16th annual Back 2 School event on August 8th at “My Sister’s House” in downtown Atlanta. This was the day before school started in most metro Atlanta counties. The purpose of the event is to ensure that all the kids we serve are prepared to go back to school:

- ◆ Dental checkups from Colgate-Palmolive’s mobile dental unit
- ◆ Georgia State Health and Wellness Collaborative provides health and visual checkups and any shots that are necessary.
- ◆ Volunteers provide haircuts so the kids will look sharp that first day of school
- ◆ 1,055 bookbags distributed to children in attendance
- ◆ 1, 822 bags distributed to children not in attendance
- ◆ *A special thanks to WSB-TV, Northside Hospital, Scana Energy and Kroger for their ongoing support!!*



This day is dedicated to preparing kids for going back to school, but it is also filled with fun activities; line dancing and karaoke, face painting, and bead making and of course our always extravagant Barbecue Buffet. Not only does this day boost the self esteem of these kids that are going through difficult times-they have new bookbags and all the school supplies they need to be on an equal footing with their more fortunate peers. We hope this day enables these kids to go Back 2 School with an optimistic attitude and a determination to do well in school!

HeadSmart: Project One on One

Education: the key to a child's future.

Many a child that has been abandoned or abused or neglected live with almost a fantasy of their future; he will be the next LeBron James, she will be the next Beyonce, he will be the next Tom Brady, she will be the next Taylor Swift. While we don't want to destroy the dreams of these children, we need to make them understand the need for a "Plan B", if "Plan A" doesn't materialize. And a good education is the best way to ensure economic freedom and a comfortable lifestyle.



Project One on One is an academic mentoring program that Ideally matches a caring adult with a child for the school year.

They meet 1 ½ hours a week and work on homework, projects, or remedial math or English skills. We endeavor to make the kids understand that learning is important and can be fun. Improving social skills and interaction is also an important aspect of the project. Too many of these children have never had a positive role model, especially one individual whose attention is directed solely on him or her. Attending basketball or hockey games, trips to the Zoo, Fernbank or the High are also an important part of the project, help mentor and student bond, and increasing mutual trust and respect.

In 2010 CRN had programs in Cherokee, Clayton, Cobb, Douglas, DeKalb, Fulton, Forsyth, Gwinnett. Our mentor pool remained over 100 by the end of the year, and approximately 300 children were being mentored.

HeadSmart: New Hope Scholarship 2010

Understanding that a good education is so vital in today's world, and for most of the best jobs a college education is needed, in 2005 CRN created the New Hope Scholarship.

New Hope Scholarships are reserved for deserving, hard working, promising seniors from a shelter or group home who do not qualify for Georgia's Hope Scholarship. Many children from shelters or group homes are good, intelligent, hard working kids. The realities of their lives though make it very difficult for them to maintain a B average. Many of these children are moved frequently, changing schools often, with too little personal attention from caring adults. Many of the homes lack computers and Internet access. These kids face an uphill battle attempting to achieve academic success. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of a personal letter from the child explaining why he should be chosen, a recommendation from a teacher or shelter staff, their high school records and extra-curricular activities, and a personal interview. The current scholarships are funded by The Celebrate the Children's Gala, Foundations, concerned individuals, businesses, and churches. The scholarships can be used either for college or technical school. *A special thanks to Kimberly-Clark, Osiason Educational Foundation, Perimeter Church and Country Club of the South Charity Guild for sponsoring New Hope Scholarships in 2010!!*

This program has proved very popular and we hope to award an ever increasing number of life-enriching scholarships each year: Since 2005 we have awarded 43 scholarships. *YOU or your company could change a child's life forever. Unfortunately, without CRN's help many of the children and mothers we serve would have a rather meager Thanksgiving to look forward to. With this in mind CRN developed our Thanksgiving Food Drive. With the help of individual families, churches, and businesses our food drive continues to grow year by year.

In 2010 CRN enlisted dozens of companies, churches, schools, and clubs to hold food drives and the results were awesome. Even in a year with many families enduring hard times the generosity of our community was overwhelming. At the end of the drive, the food was all brought together the weekend before Thanksgiving. During the weekend 322 volunteers helped sort the food and then allocate the food according to how many residents each shelter or group home provided for. The Spirit of Thanksgiving and Thankfulness was obvious to the volunteers and the people who received the food.

A special thanks goes to AJC International & the Nationwide Insurance Foundation. AJC International donated 13,000 pounds of turkey breasts, 15,000 pounds of frozen food and close to \$10,000 in cash and gift cards! The Nationwide Insurance Foundation donated \$10,000 to the campaign.



On Thanksgiving Day 2010, a record-breaking 341 CRN volunteers helped cook and serve truly awesome Thanksgiving Dinners at 15 large shelters and group homes around metro Atlanta. CRN also provided the Thanksgiving food for other shelters and group homes. Over 2,500 children and mothers were served. The food was in such great abundance it also filled the pantries of these organizations with canned goods and non-perishable items to ensure they were well-stocked for the Holiday Season.

In a year that has been so rough economically, Georgians stepped up to the plate and hit a homerun this Holiday Season.

Over 7,500 gifts, for 1,165 kids living in shelters or group homes, were donated, wrapped, personalized, and delivered in 20 counties around metro Atlanta. In addition, over 7,000 other gifts were given to agencies serving over 2,000 under-privileged kids. These totals do not reflect the children who were “adopted” in CRN’s Adopt a Shelter program, so the twin campaigns were incredibly successful!

Almost 1,200 volunteers helped during the campaign sorting, wrapping, and delivering gifts and having parties with the kids. This event has truly become a family tradition for many families in metro Atlanta. We have some volunteers who have actually attended all 16 Wrap Parties.

343 for Kids

Over the years, CRN has seen the number of homeless children skyrocket, but many people still don't realize that homeless children and mothers make up 60% of the homeless population and that homeless children are the largest growing segment of the homeless population. To help raise awareness about this growing, silent epidemic, CRN decided to bring the world's eyes to Atlanta to set the Guinness World Record for the Longest Concert by Multiple Artists.

We holed up at the Red Rabbit in Johns Creek for 343 straight hours as music flowed around us for 14 days straight. Whether we were enjoying orchestral suites, head-banging to some heavy metal, or chilling to a jazz trio, we enjoyed the opportunity to listen to some great music and give a voice to those homeless children that so often were ignored. And on July 25th, 2010, CRN set the Guinness World Record for the longest concert at 343 hours, 7 minutes, and 52 seconds.



Throughout all of this, we were not alone. We had 265 bands and over 850 volunteers come out and help. We were joined by thousands of people who came out to the Red Rabbit to show their support for this cause. We had over 21,000 views to our live streaming of the concert for those people who couldn't make it out to the event or who were watching from home.

Through the press, we were able to let our community know about this crisis as we had PSAs aired on WSB-TV & Dave FM; did interviews with Good Day Atlanta, WSB-TV; and were featured on the front page and in features articles of local newspapers for five weeks straight. And with Comcast On Demand running a feature on the 343 For Kids concert, and with Guinness featuring this record on its website, we put a spotlight on the thousands of homeless children who were the real stars of this event that shone worldwide.

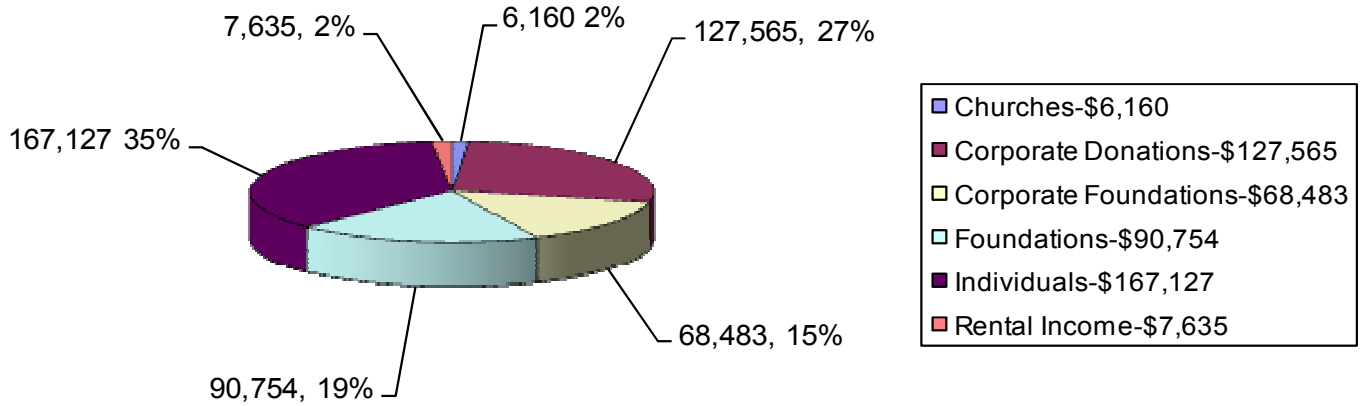

Whether as an individual with a caring heart, a family looking to share quality time, or a business wanting to give back to the community, volunteerism enhances a person's life and improves our society.

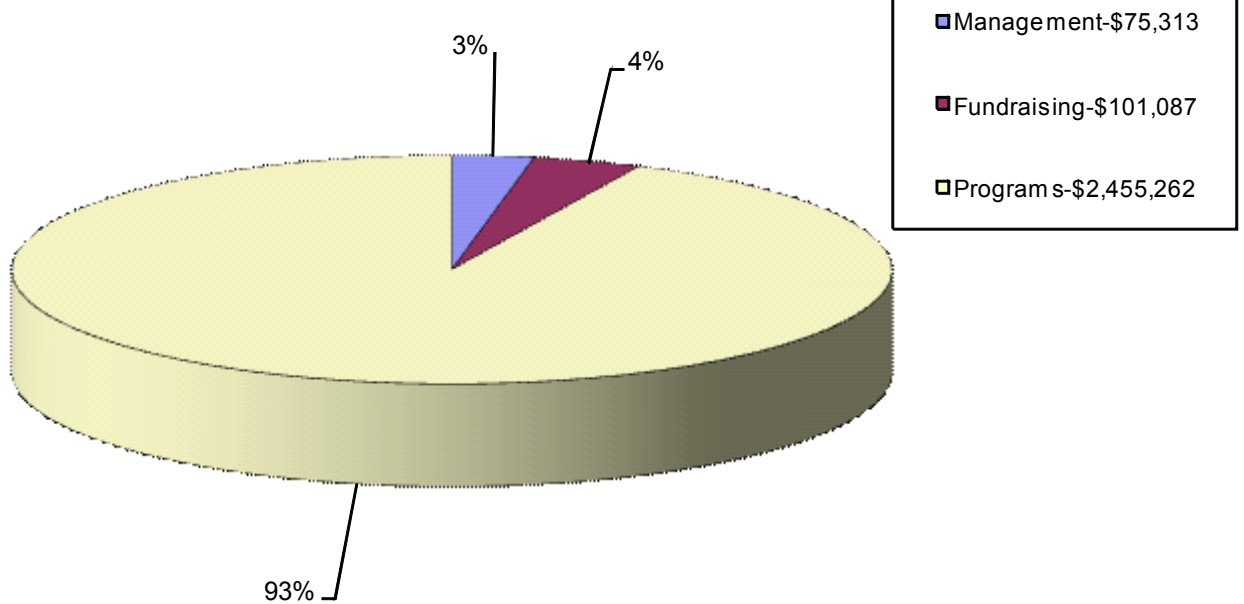

Income

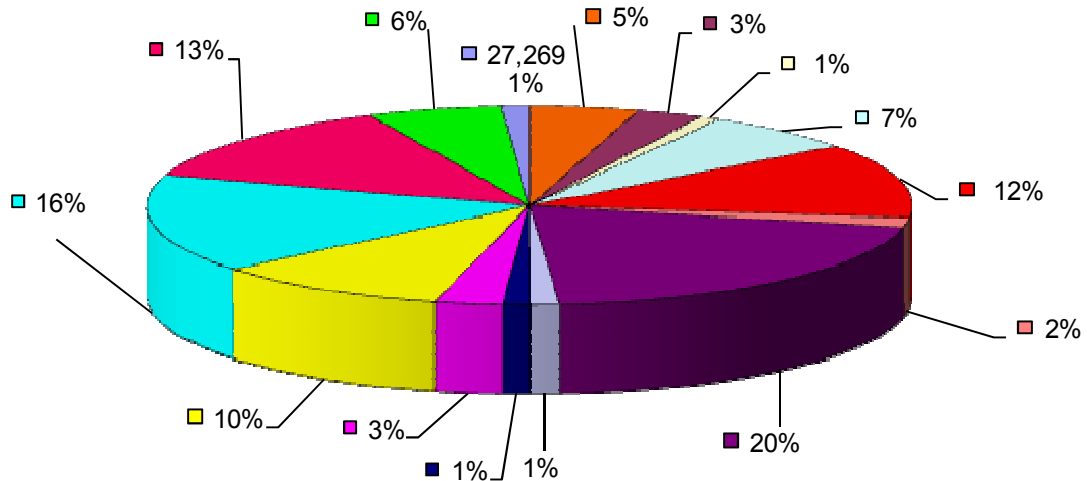


Expense Categories- including In-kind donation

(Staff salaries and overhead were divided among all three categories according to time spent on each)

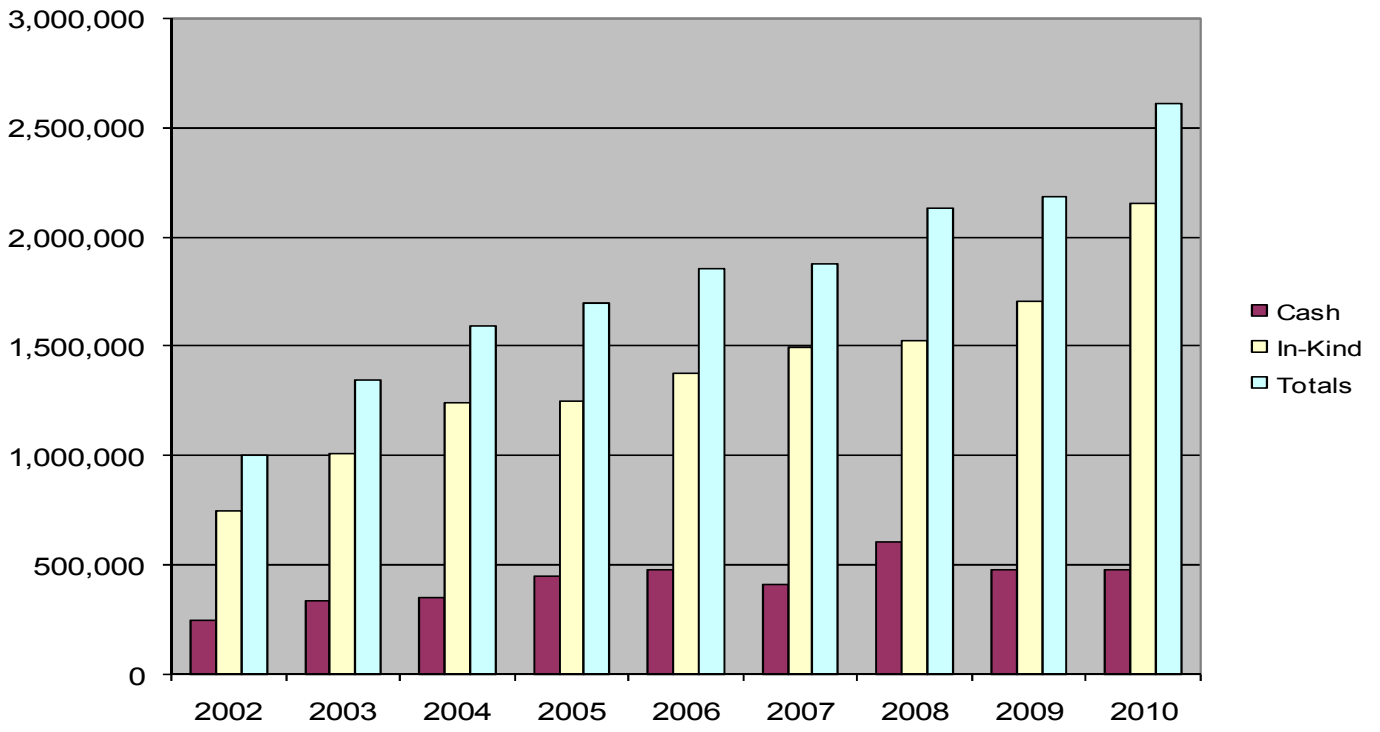


Children's Restoration Network's Major Program Breakdown
